The DRANREF Foundation

The DRANREF Foundation (TDF) dba The Abacus Project was established in 2015 to create STEM education and entrepreneurship experiences to improve school achievement and employability for black youth.

The Abacus Project is our signature program. Participants learn how to make and use a Japanese counting tool, called a soroban, to build confidence, challenge thinking skills and improve math fluency. In past years, we primarily served 2nd through 6th grade students. In 2019, we tweaked our programming and successfully engaged 133 Kindergarten and 1st grade students. In total, we delivered abacus programming to 145 District of Columbia public school and charter school students and 13 teachers.




Vision & Mission

- Our mission is to grow problem solvers and entrepreneurs by creating and implementing scalable and sustainable programs and experiences.










Why the Abacus?

- Research shows that consistent practice on the soroban (Japanese abacus) improves math fluency, accuracy and speed, concentration and creativity.
- Our objective is to use this evidence-based instructional tool to measurably reduce the achievement gap in under resourced and diverse communities.

In 2019, TDF served 295 students and 13 teachers. However, since inception, TDF has engaged 2,040 students and 130 teachers, and has surpassed its 2025 goal of serving as 2,025 students by 2025.

The abacus classroom sessions, professional development for teachers, and community outreach events conducted over the past 5 years has paved the way for the next generation of problem solvers and entrepreneurs.




What's Next for TDF?









