
Vision & Mission

Why the Abacus?

TDF's signature program is the Abacus Project. Research shows that consistent practice on the soroban (Japanese abacus) improves math fluency, accuracy and speed, concentration and creativity. Our objective is to use this evidence-based instructional tool to measurably reduce the achievement gap in under resourced and diverse communities.








Helping Hands

It was a slow process, finding ways to access teachers and students. We were fortunate to deliver our hands-on curriculum to teachers more than 1000 miles away from our home base. We mailed DIY abacus making kits to the homes of more than 30 teachers in Atlanta, GA and hosted our first virtual workshop in December 2020. Teachers reported that the training was extremely effective in teaching them how to make and use the abacus, that it was feasible to incorporate the abacus into their curriculum and that it would be useful for their students to learn. What we know is that early math achievement is the catalyst and best predictor for later academic success and with the pandemic exacerbating many of the existing disparities and inequities in education for black students in particular, we continue to focus on innovative solutions.


